

## Topic: Children and Families of Tribal Nations - Effective Engagement with Tribes to Secure Best Outcomes



## Topic: Understanding Relationships and their Importance to Early Childhood Development

Description: Within this presentation, we will discuss how children develop within the context of their primary relationships and the way in which our formative relationships contribute to the development of resiliency and vulnerability. By enriching a child's relational opportunities, we can shift the trajectory of their development toward a life of physical and mental health. Together, we will consider the life-long impact of early life exposure to toxic stress and trauma, gain a deeper understanding of the immense protective value of attuned, supportive relationships, and identify practical ways to apply cutting-edge research from the fields of psychology and neuroscience to your daily work with young children and their families.

## Topic: Recognizing and Responding to the Mental Health and Caregiver-Child Relationship Needs of Medically-Complex Children

Description: Supporting the health needs of medically complex children in foster care is frequently imbalanced; with significant attention paid to medical management of their illness and relatively less attention paid to the impact of their condition on mental health and the caregiver-child relationship. This presentation will help CASA/GAL staff and volunteers understand the connection between medical conditions and mental health symptoms in children and how this can lead to needs within the caregiver-child relationship. ## FOCUS AREA: Poverty and Child Welfare

## Topic: Poverty, Income and Child Maltreatment

Description: A growing evidence base suggests that early childhood poverty, income, and employment might be a root cause of involvement with child protective services. As young children stand to benefit the most from early intervention, these findings implythat income relief might increase child safety as well.

After describing the historical trends in poverty, income, and employment, we will examine more closely the growing body of empirical and theoretical scientific literature and the specific policies and interventions that provide the scaffolding for universalmaltreatment prevention.

## Topic: Core Drug Endangered Children (DEC) Awareness

Description: In this webinar we discuss the risks and the impacts on children who have, or are, growing up in homes where there is familial and/or caregiver legal or illegal substance misuse or addiction. These children often experience numerous risks and traumas. And they do not have the same childhood development experiences compared to children who grow up in environments where substance misuse is not present. What does that mean? What are the risks? What is the trauma? What should professionals and community members be looking for?

## Topic: Drug Identification and Trends

Description: In this webinar participants will learn more information around drug identification and trends, so professionals and community members know what to look for. Many professionals know about addiction and substance misuse...but many do not know about drug identification and drug trends. For example, a child welfare investigator may not know what a meth pipe looks like, what marijuana extract looks like or smells like, or what other drugs or paraphernalia look like or smell like...and if they do not know, how are they identifying these in order to help children and families? This presentation is a general course for all staff and volunteers about drugs, paraphernalia, and trends in the field, so they know what they are looking for to help.

#### Topic: Intersection of Drug-Endangered Children (DEC) and Human/Sex Trafficking

Description: Did you know that Human/Sex Trafficking and DEC intersect? Did you know that a large majority of the children trafficked have parents, caregivers or family members also using legal or illegal substances? Did you know that many trafficking victims also use drugs for a variety of reasons? There is a disconnect across the country on how substance misuse and trafficking are connected and what professionals and volunteers can look for and how they can help. This presentation will look at both drug endangered children and human/sex trafficking individually as well as their intersections to increase knowledge of the issues as well as ideas of how to identify and help these at-risk children. Presenters will provide data, information, and examples to round out the picture for participants.
